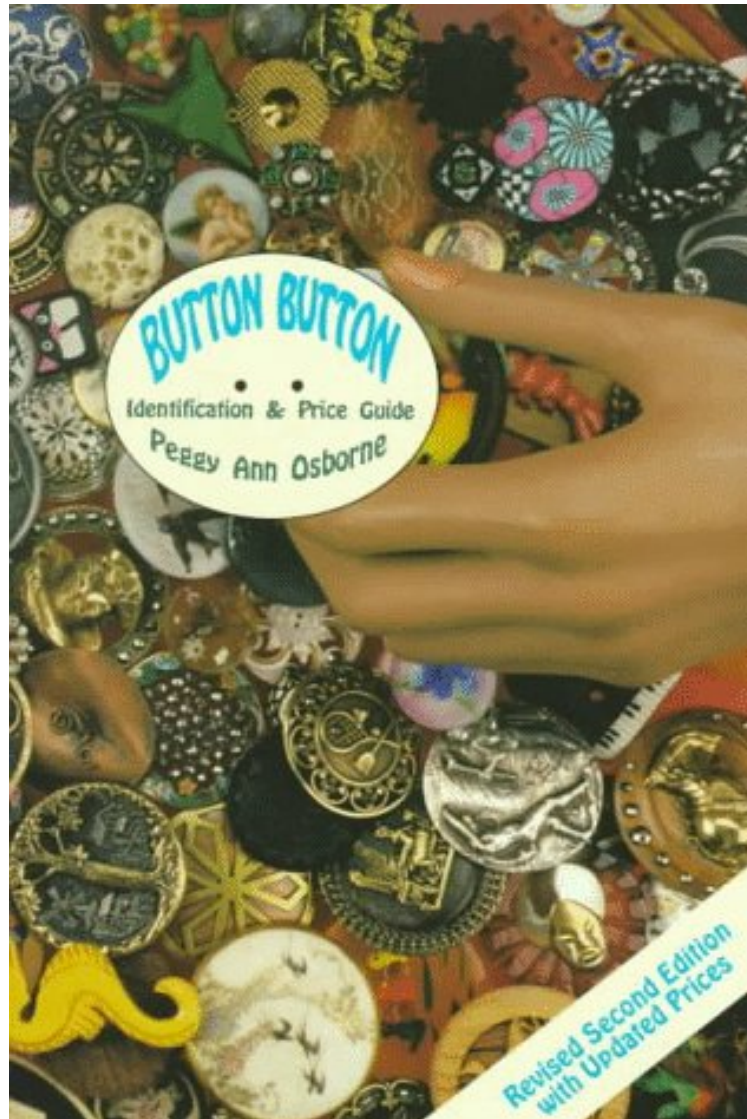

The photos are mediocre, and the "Price Guide" is difficult to use, and is not very complete. For example, it will give you a page number and then say the buttons on the top section of the page (and

they could be referring to more than half a dozen buttons) range from \$X amount to \$X amount. It's really quite vague.
