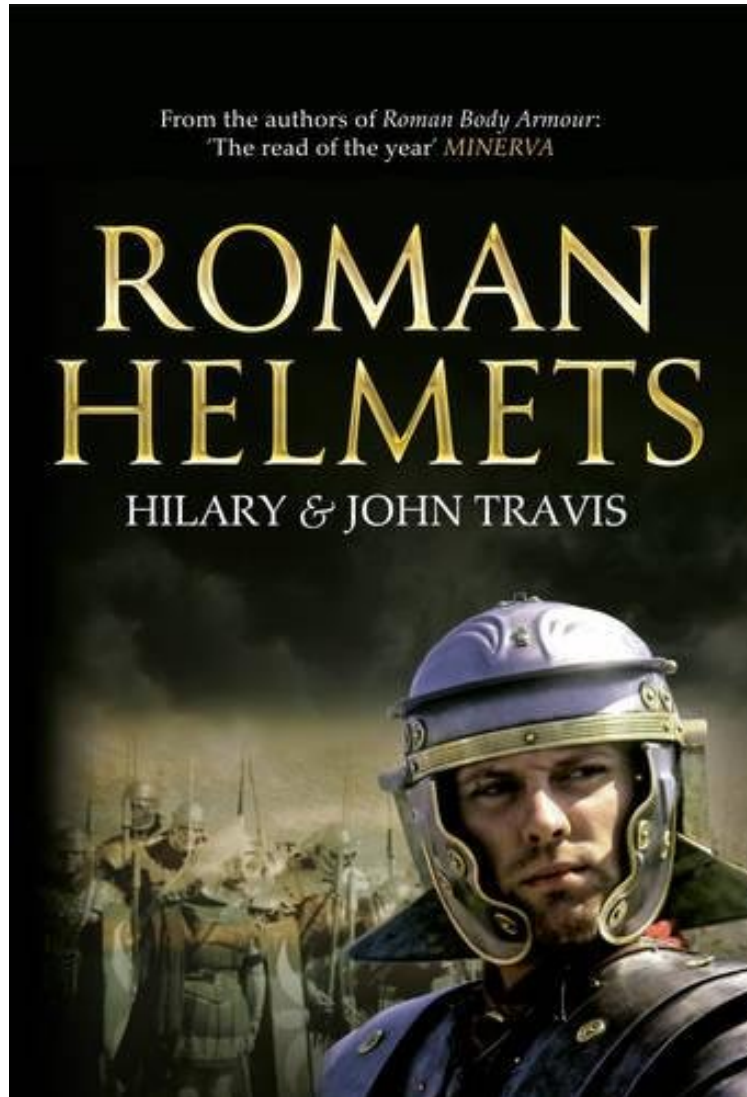

In "Roman Helmets" the authors provide a detailed evolution of the helmets and how the helmets were manufactured. Manufacturing helmets, and other weapons and armor, was no small feat when one considers the

number and distribution of soldiers. The information in this book provides insight into how the armor was manufactured and then sent to the frontiers and internal forces. In addition, this book explains how the armor evolved to meet new battle tactics as well as being more easily manufactured during later periods. The illustrations are excellent and the pictures quite fun. This is an enjoyable book for the amateur historian and an important addition to a professional library.

The Roman military is an iconic, ancient institution; everybody is familiar with the image of fearsome Roman centurions marching in their famous columns. In this book, Roman military experts Hilary and John Travis turn their attention to the helmets used by the historic Roman stalwarts, drawing on their expertise, their wealth of illustrated material and the world of reenactments. There are currently two different methods in use in the identification of Roman helmet types: the British system, based on developmental progression and features indicating the geographical area of manufacture; and the much simplified Continental system, based on named find locations. In this study of helmets used by the Romans, *Roman Helmets* draws together the streams of published information of sculptural imagery and archaeological 'hard' evidence, while also comparing these dual typologies, discussing their strengths and weaknesses.

Roman Helmets was written to address the current lack of up-to-date research into Roman military equipment. It examines ancient literature, sculptures, wall paintings, art, and archaeological finds to produce more reliable, evidence-based views of the Roman military, suggesting that there was a range in equipment used that served a variety of military functions. This book is part of a series restricted to a study of defensive armor deemed to be the most essential in equipping the earliest Roman armies, discussing the most commonly used materials, including bronze, iron, leather, and wood. In particular, this text addresses the origins of the Roman helmet and its developmental progression in shape and function.
