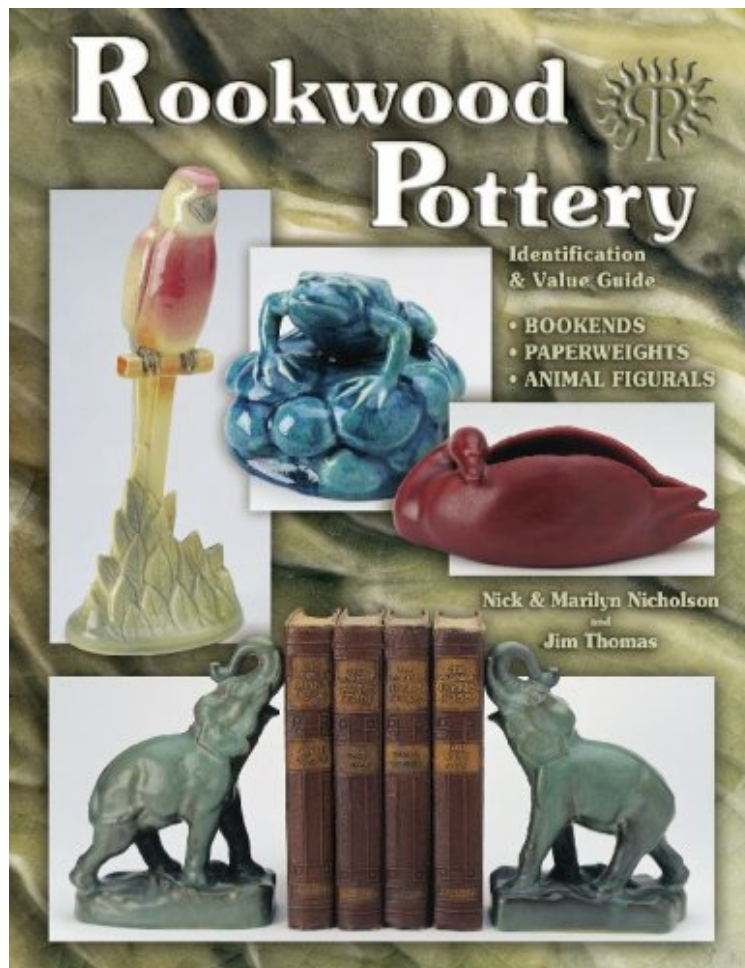


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## Rookwood Pottery, Identification Value Guide, Bookends, Paperweights Animal Figurals
